A NOTE FROM THE DEAN

Netiquette

I was recently part of an informal conversation with several professors from other universities who were discussing some students' emails. One was talking about the wonderful email she had received from a student who was expressing thanks for a "great semester." She was so impressed that a student would take the time to write such an email. Another was expressing concern over the way a student "told, rather than asked" about missing a class. He was unhappy that the student had not cleared the absence in advance, as they had a special in-class assignment that day that the student could not make up. And still another professor was dismayed by an email in which the student addressed the professor by her first name. She thought the student displayed a lack of respect by using her professor's first name, rather than her title.

This conversation led to me to thinking about the topic of netiquette, which refers to the correct or acceptable way of communicating on the internet. If you are interested in knowing more, search the internet for "netiquette."

In the meantime, I would like to share some tips that friends who are either professors, teachers, or in business, have mentioned to me:

If you want your email to be professional and leave a positive impression, try the following:

- When writing to a professor, boss, or doctor, use their title, not their firs name.
- Leave out any slang or text abbreviations.
- Be careful not to write when you are angry.
- Remember that using the caps lock can come across as "shouting" in an email.
- Reread your email before you send it, and if you are uncertain about the tone of your email, don't send it until you change the tone.
- Proofread your email for grammatical errors before sending.

As a student myself, I was always amazed at how quickly the last semester of the year flew by, and how it never seemed that way when I was in the thick of it. As the semester draws to a close, I encourage you to think of the moments that have made the greatest impact on you and your learning. What will you take away from your classes? From the semester? From your time at Madonna? Chase moments like these and stride for more of these moments as you transition from college student into life-long learner. I look forward to hearing your stories. Applying early is important because there are a number of requirements that need to be met. These requirements are listed to the left of this column under "TEP Checklist". It is highly encouraged that you begin submitting these items as you gather them, allowing the Director of Matriculation to build your TEP Application. Please do not wait to submit everything at once.

Access the TEP Application and the Letter of Recommendation template by logging into "MY Portal." Click on "Students" at the top, then "Find MY Form" on the left. Select the letter "T" for Teacher Education.

ADVISING, RETENTION, AND CERTIFICATION

Grade Band Updates

The Education Division continues to make changes to meet the State of Michigan's new grade band teacher endorsement requirements. Madonna rolled out the Elementary and Early Childhood Education grade bands during the Fall of 2021. The grade bands are pre-kindergarten to third grade (PK-3), third grade to sixth grade (3-6), and birth to kindergarten (B-K). Our Madonna students will complete the PK – 3 grade band and choose either the 3 – 6 concentration or the B – K concentration as well. Some of our Madonna Elementary and Early Childhood Education Students got into the classroom and began their field placements during this 2022-23 school year.

Madonna will begin to roll out the secondary grade bands this upcoming Fall 2023. Secondary grade bands are seventh to twelfth grade (7-12) and fifth to ninth grade (5-9). Students pursuing secondary education will get certified in content areas such as English, Mathematics, Science, and Social Studies. Madonna is also updating our kindergarten to twelfth grade (K-12) programs to meet the new PK -12 certification which adds preschool requirements. These programs include American Sign Language (ASL), Art Education, Music Education, Physical Education and Health, and Spanish. The Education Division continues to work hard to meet the changes required by the Michigan Department of Education so that our Madonna students are prepared and will be some of the first students in the state to complete the new grade band endorsements.

FIELD PLACEMENTS

All Education Division students complete four field placements in the educational sequence of classes prior to student teaching. Students in EDU 2000, EDU 3120, EDU 4410, and EDU 4500 are required to complete 30 clock hours of classroom observation. In addition, EDU 3300 requires another 30-hour observation in a special education setting. Therefore, our students complete more than 100 hours of observation within the education field as they go through the Teacher Education Program.

Each observation experience is an important step in preparing students for their culminating student teaching experience and for their future career. These observations provide a firsthand look at the workings of a classroom, as teachers open their doors and let you explore all aspects of the educational process. You can interact with students and observe some awesome teaching techniques. In addition, you will build confidence and accumulate a variety of strategies, which you can apply in the future.

As the Field Placement Coordinator, it is my job to locate placements for each student, for each of their 30-hour placements. To do this, I utilize the Michigan Department of Education requirements, the Education Division network, applicable student accommodations, along with support and encouragement.

Teachers and administrators have many positive comments about Madonna students, as they represent the Education Division in their field placements. Our students are seen as well-prepared and hard-working. We are proud of you—keep up the good work!

- How many hours are required?

COORDINATOR OF DIRECTED TEACHING

Student teaching is an important and exciting time in your preparation as a teacher! All Madonna University students who are pursuing teacher certification will student teach, and it's important to be aware of upcoming deadlines and mandatory meetings. It may feel like student teaching is a long way off, but the requirements and preparation for student teaching begin up to a year before you student teach! Here's what you need to know:

All students—right from your first education courses—**please pay attention to the student teaching schedules and deadlines** that are posted around the offices of the College of Education and Human Development. Get them in your calendar right away!

Watch for emails that come from Dr. Les Sharon, and make sure to read them! All students who have been enrolled in EDU 3000-level courses should start getting these emails—if you think you have been left off the list, please contact Dr. Les Sharon at lsharon@madonna.edu so the situation can be fixed.

Fall 2023 student teachers should have attended the mandatory orientation on Friday, May 5, 2023 from 3-4pm in room 2105. If you missed this, contact Dr. Sharon.

If you are looking forward to Fall 2023 student teaching, your student teaching application was due on January 9, 2023. If you plan to student teach in Winter 2024, your application was due April 1. 2023. See Dr. Sharon if you have questions.


